1851 Summary

Residents 161 in 30 houses (2 uninhabited) [previously 100 residents in 23 houses)— a big increase assuming they covered the same area - 18 extra houses. Barton,s mill has closed and a colliery opened on Button Hill.

OCCUPATIONS

Colliers 8; they would account for an increase of 17 in the population.

Metal workers, Moscar had two wheels – one for cutlery and one for scythes- forging presumably by hand. Cutlers 3+ 3 apprentices, 1 grinder, razorsmith, spring knife 3, Scythesmiths 7+3 grinders.

Millers 3 + 1 apprentice, Millwright 1

Farmers 7 farming 227 acres. Appleton, Schofield, Gill, Smith, Brown, Barton, Speight

Agr Labs 11 [increase from 3 in previous decade]

Brickmakers 6 Presumably using the quarry opposite Sainsbury

Millhouses' personality of the fifties has to be Ann Downing.

In the 1841 census, she is listed as landlady of the Wagon and Horses, also farming 19 acres. She had been widowed some time during the thirties and at the age of thirty-five, has five children in-house – her oldest son has left home. By 1851, two more have left home, so she can afford to leave the pub in order to set up as Millhouses' first schoolmistress. This was more than twenty years before our first Education Act of 1870, so, parents would have had to pay. She was responsible for thirty-two pupils aged between two and fourteen, from fifteen families out of a possible seventeen, which says a lot for her. The school was still running ten years later, but she died during the following decade at around sixty years of age, having done her bit for her community.
